

Thrive

A message from Mrs Pearson.

Creativity, play and the arts make up one of the four 'pillars' of Thrive. Research shows that embracing children and young people's creative side has benefits to their emotional wellbeing and development. These are some ways in which you can do this at home.


- Let your children get bored. Do not rescue them from their boredom by giving them something to do; instead, let them rescue themselves. This is one of the best opportunities for a child to be creative! Know that this means that your child has an opportunity to discover something about what and who they are, what they like to do and can do, and how to manifest ideas into reality.
- 2. **Get outside!** Go for a walk or just sit outside and observe. Sometimes the best creative play opportunities arise when there is nothing around but nature. Changing the environment can give us a new perspective on ourselves and all sorts of other things.
- 3. **Invite your child to tell a story, compose a poem, make up a song, create a play, or invent a dance.** Give them your attention when they are ready for an audience. If they ask you for a topic, invite them to come up with one on their own. Make it a family tradition to tell stories, sing songs together, and entertain with funny, made-up jokes.
- 4. **Lead by example.** Start a creative project yourself, and let your children observe and join in. Make a card, decorate something, or create art just for the joy of it. Do you have creative hobbies that you can share with your children? Leading by example is one of the best ways to encourage our children to be courageously creative people.
- 5. Allow things to get messy, disorganized, and cluttered. Creativity can be messy. Do not allow your need for cleanliness to take over your life! Many of us parents develop a feeling that it is our job to keep things clean and 'fight the mess' continually. You could inadvertently be sending a message that kids are being inconvenient to you by playing or creating art. Nevertheless, at the same time...



A Reading Community




KS1: Can't You Sleep Little Bear



Attendance Notice:

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

School Uniform Update from DfE:

In light of the recent DfE guidance issued to schools regarding school uniforms, we have reviewed our uniform list and are not proposing changes, as we think the uniform requirements meet the needs of our school community. We will, however, be publishing further information on the provision of second-hand uniform sale and continue to work with our uniform suppliers on improving the provision (or exploring further cost reduction avenues).
