A message from Mrs Pearson.

Welcome Back! This week my news update is about anxiety. Anxiety can have a huge impact on the children at any age, and so I would like to share some information to help you understand Anxiety should your child experience it.

What is Anxiety?

It is normal for children to feel worried or anxious from time to time – such as when they are starting school or nursery, or moving to a new area. However, for some children, anxiety affects their behaviour and thoughts every day, interfering with their school, home and social life.

Everybody experiences anxiety at some point in time. Anxiety is a natural response, useful in helping us to avoid dangerous situations and motivating us to solve everyday issues.

What is the root cause of anxiety in children?

For some, children who have endured trauma or witnessed traumatic events are at higher risk of developing an anxiety disorder at some point in life. Adults who experience a traumatic event can also develop anxiety disorders.

Symptoms of anxiety in children!

*finding it hard to concentrate

*not sleeping, or waking in the night with bad dreams

*not eating properly

*quickly getting angry or irritable, and being out of control during outbursts

*constantly worrying or having negative thoughts

*feeling tense and fidgety, or using the toilet often

*always crying and being clingy


*complaining of tummy aches and feeling unwell


A Reading Community

"Okay, Okay. So hang me. I killed the bird. For pity's sake, I'm a cat."


Poor Ellie is horrified when Tuffy drags a dead bird into the house. Then a mouse. But Tuffy can't understand what all the fuss is about.

The hilarious antics of Tuffy and his family as told by the killer cat himself.



Attendance Notice:

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.
