Nurture Inspire Strive

Dear Parents & Carers,

With another busy few weeks behind us, I share below what each year group has been learning about as part of their wider curriculum projects:

- Nursery Children have been exploring Aboriginal art and the work of Alma Woodsey Thomas.
- Reception Children have been thinking about their use of colour, shape and line in their artwork, as well as choices they can make with their own art work.
- Y1 Children have been drawing simple maps of their school environment, and will begin to explore the use of pencil in art.
- Y2 Children have been exploring the work of Roy Lichtenstein and turning their focus to printing.
- Y3 Children have been focusing on what we can learn about a historical period through art, and then turning their focus to portraits.
- Y4 Children have been considering the importance of monograms under Viking and Anglo-Saxon rule.
- Y5 Children have been creating silhouettes and transferring these images onto a 3D surface.
- Y6 Children have been making comparisons between Baghdad and Britain circa 900 CE, before turning their focus to the features of Islamic art.

Thank you to all of the parents and carers who attended the wider curriculum parent workshop on Tuesday- the slides from this workshop are now available on the school website.


Greek Heroes - top ten myths and legends by Marcia Williams






Amazing Maurice and his Educated Rodents by Terry Pratchett

snakes.




Emily, Year 5- has been learning how to use the art tools on her iPad. She's very proud of these

Attendance Notice

A reminder to parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.
