### Dear Parents & Carers,

We are racing into the Summer term with lots of fantastic learning and events planned for the children this term. Over the past 2 weeks the children have been getting stuck into their new topics. This half term there is a focus on Science so children will be exploring their enquiry question through this lens. Here are the general overviews for each year group so you know what all children are learning across the school:

- Nursery Growth and change.
- Reception Classifying living and non-living things.
- Y1 How do scientists compare animals?
- Y2 How does an animal's habitat provide it with what it needs to live?
- Y3 What do all plants have and need in order to survive?
- Y4 How are living things and their environment connected?
- Y5 The way things grow affects the way we live. Support or Challenge?
- Y6 What is variation and what does that mean for all living things?

This week we have had some visitors to the school- a sheep and her two lambs! This year we have been lucky to participate in the South of England Agricultural Society 'Loan a lamb' scheme. The lambs were dropped off by the farmer on Monday and have spent the week with us. This has given the children the opportunity to pet, feed and look after them-learning about the life of sheep, understanding how to care for them and gaining an insight into farming life! On Thursday we were interviewed by BBC Radio Surrey. The piece is expected to be broadcast on the radio next week so keep your ears tuned!

Thank you to those year 1 parents who attended out Phonics Screening Check workshop yesterday. If you were unable to attend then further information will be sent out to year 1 parents and will also be available on the website.


# The Nothing to See Here Hotel by Steven Butler



### **Attendance Notice**

A reminder to parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority, they will be liable to receive a penalty notice. Currently the amount payable under a penalty notice is £60.00 per parent/carer per child if paid within 21 days. Thereafter the amount increases to £120.00 if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.
