Early Years

In Nursery the children have been exploring the great outdoors. They have explored our large school field on the hunt for different coloured Autumn leaves. Part of the challenge was making sure they could all put on wellies and coats to keep their feet dry. Well done!







In Reception, children have continued to build their knowledge of different sounds. Every day the teacher spends time with the children teaching and reviewing the sounds and beginning to blend them into words. All with the help of 'Fred' the frog.

KS1

Year 1 have been continuing to look at different materials. They have used vocabulary such as **opaque**, **transparent** and **translucent** to describe them.

Year 2 have been bringing in their teddies from home. Their Autumn 1 project will be to make a coat for them. This week they have been considering different materials and

their properties.











PHASE NEWS

Year 3 used their learning about wheels and axles to make magnet powered cars. They have used a range of materials and considered how they could be joined.

Year 4 have finished their first book of the half term, The Queen's Nose. Children have also been using adverbs and adverbial phrases to improve their sentences.






UKS2

A message from Mrs Pearson

This half term in Thrive, we have been looking at different emotions and ways to lift a low mood. Everyone feels sad sometimes and that is completely normal. Our feelings come and go all the time. However, if you are feeling sad or low and it lasts for longer and starts to affect your everyday life then try some of these helpful tips.

- 1. Share your feelings with someone. It can be helpful to talk about how you are feeling.
- 2. Challenge any unhelpful thoughts. Remind yourself that thoughts are not facts.
- 3. Take care of your wellbeing and make sure you get enough sleep, food and water daily.
- 4. Start your day with a positive thought and end your day with three good things that have happened during the day.
- 5. Some daily exercise that makes your heart pump faster. It might be hard, but it can make you feel much better.
- 6. Take time out every day (10-15 minutes) to do something you enjoy and that relaxes you.
- 7. Music is very powerful. Listen to your favourite music.
- 8. Relax in a hot bath with a candle lit.
- 9. Keep a mood diary and write down your feelings.
- 10. Sit and watch TV as a family.

Ask your children what they have learnt about their emotions. Ask them how do they calm down when feeling angry? What do they do when they are feeling hurt? Who can they speak to when feeling sad? All these emotions have been spoken about this half term.

HILLCROFT NUT SAFETY STATEMENT

Hillcroft school has a NO NUTS policy to protect the health and wellbeing of staff members, children and volunteers who suffer with nut allergies.

Many nut allergies are serious and so we ask that both staff and child lunches and snacks do not contain nuts of any kind and that products with nuts in the ingredients are not used. This includes items like peanut butter, Nutella spread and snacks, certain cakes and cereal bars among others.



Please always check the ingredients of a food if you are unsure before sending it in with your child. Any nut products found in snacks or lunches will be confiscated and will be unable to be consumed. The school office should be informed immediately if a child has an allergy to nuts.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH



In October we celebrate Black History Month, focusing on some of the key figures and moments from the Civil Rights movement both in Britain and abroad. We will be introducing this with an assembly, and there will be themes running through our life skills lessons.

Towards the end of the half term, every year group will have the opportunity to watch a film or TV series bringing to life some of the issues which we will then be examining in class. Hopefully this will then feed into discussions both at home and in school around racism and equality.

ATTENDANCE

Just to remind parents/carers that if they take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

- 1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of the receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
- 1. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 9 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charred at a flat rate f £160.00, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.

If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the firsts penalty notice was issued, then you NOT receive a third penalty notice - Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer, in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 Education Act 1996
